Since May 2019, the district has been busy with Series I projects. To date, we have progressed with the following projects:

- Four (4) new school busses purchased

- Planning and designing phase of the renovation of the Main Office
- Lighting and roof replacement planning

WESTVIEW LOWER ELEMENTARY SCHOOL

Planning and designing phase of all restroom upgrades and renovation

SCHOFIELD EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER

- Playground fencing installed
- Stage improvement planning

The bond proposal is designed to:

- Enhance safety and security by remodeling and equipping school buildings, playgrounds and other facilities.
- Improve energy efficiency with roofing, lighting and mechanical system replacements.
- Update and remodel classrooms and school facilities.
- Upgrade technology and technology infrastructure.
- Replace school busses as they reach the end of their useful lives.

One of the first projects to be completed this March will be an upgrade to the Chatterton Planetarium. This includes replacement of the 50 year old projection system. The upgrades will bring state-of-the-art laser projection to the district. The lighting and sound systems will also be replaced to provide more energy efficient operation. The new equipment will enhance and invigorate astronomy, earth science and biology instruction for grade levels across the district.

School Parking Lots

When teachers, students, staff and parents follow arrival/dismissal expectations, we all work together to keep everyone safe. School parking lots can be incredibly busy places in the morning when children arrive and in the afternoon during dismissal. Safety is a primary concern of the school staff, but it requires everyone's participation.

Many parents drop off and pick up students by driving or carpooling, and these safety tips can help with safe arrival and dismissal.

- Stay in designated pick up areas as directed by school personnel.
- Yield to pedestrians, crossing guards, and buses, and be aware that children who are walking home may not look both ways before venturing in or across a roadway.
- Speed on school campus is to be kept at or below 10 mph and drivers must operate their vehicles with due care and caution at all times.
- Be sure to drive the proper direction through parking lots and nearby streets.
- When waiting for students to be released, pull all the way forward on the curb to allow other cars ample room and minimize driving around.

Most important, parents should be patient, respectful, and courteous to other drivers while they pick their students up from school. Anger and frustration can lead to careless, unsafe behavior, and being a positive role model can help students learn safe procedures.

ARE YOU AWARE . . . READING IS THE MOST IMPORTANT SUBJECT IN SCHOOL

Fact: Students who do more reading at home are better readers and have higher math scores!

Reading with your child is a proven way to promote early literacy. One of the most important things you can do to prepare your child for his/her future is helping to make sure that your child is reading at grade level by third grade. You can influence your child's success in school by making reading a daily routine in your home. Research shows that students who read at least 20 minutes per day score in the 90th percentile on standardized tests.

WHAT PARENTS CAN DO TO SUPPORT THEIR CHILD:

- Read out loud to your child (with a book, tablet, phone or computer)
- Listen to your child read
- Echo read (you read a line, then they repeat)
- Read together at the same time
- · Reread or retell favorite stories
- · Talk to your child about the reading

AS YOU READ:

- Ask your child to share what they remember
- Ask questions about the reading
- Talk about your favorite parts
- Talk about what you have learned
- Talk about how the pictures in the book connect to the words on the page
- Help connect the reading to your child's life or other books

Staff Development

As educators we are always reflecting on how to improve our teaching practices to best serve our students. This year Mound Park teachers have made a commitment to improving our math practices for the betterment of our students through a training called "Molding Math Mindsets." Teachers have been attending coaching sessions that will continue throughout the year in order to strengthen our knowledge of how to best instruct our students in the area of math. One of the key focuses so far is a practice called **Number Talks**. Teachers learned about the practice, saw it modeled, and have now been practicing utilizing it in their classrooms.

Math Mindset Training for Staff Engages Students in Math

One of the best things about being a teacher is the opportunity to be a lifelong learner. Throughout the 2019-2020 school year our Fitzgerald staff in grades K-5 are participating in an intensive Math Mindset professional development program led by the founder of Strategic Intervention Solutions for Teachers. This hands on training provides our staff with new and engaging activities and manipulatives our staff can use when supporting students who struggle with numeracy skills. The training focuses on a core group of concepts and characters who each represent an important foundational mathematics skill. For example, D.C. wears a hard hat and has a mallet because he loves to smash numbers apart and build new ones. Our students are learning about these characters and how they can help them when breaking apart complex numbers into smaller more manageable ones. As we move into the second training in November our students have shared with us that they enjoy the new characters and that they make learning math fun. Engage your student in a mathematical conversation by asking your student what Math Ville character they have been talking about in their classrooms.

Westview Homework Helper Club is Now Available!

One of the concerns we often hear from our parents is that they are sometimes unsure of how to best help their students with their homework. The Westview Homework Helpers Club is a great resource for Westview students to get some extra help with their homework from our dedicated Westview teachers. The Homework Helpers Club runs every Tuesday and Thursday morning from 7:45am - 8:15am in Mr. Avoledo's classroom. Students must bring homework or an assignment with them to work on to attend the Homework Helpers Club. Mrs. Wisdom and Mr. Avoledo are available to help students with their reading, math, science, or social studies homework as they enjoy a breakfast snack together. Reading Intervention for All Students Focuses on "What I Need"

Lach student in Fitzgerald Public Schools has a unique learning style and individual needs and supports when it comes to meeting their reading goals. One of the ways that Westview Lower Elementary and Mound Park Upper Elementary School support our students unique learning needs is through a program called What I Need (WIN) Reading Intervention. The WIN model allows district Reading Specialists to work with classroom teachers to group students into different reading intervention programs that will best support that students individual needs as they continue to grow and progress in their reading goals. Students travel to a different classroom and work with a member of our dedicated staff for a minimum of 30 minutes per day focusing on supports that are geared towards the students individual reading goals. This allows our students to get the opportunity to work together in small groups, utilize technology to enhance their learning, and get specialized support from a variety of district staff.



Student Advisory Support Proves to Be Effective & Positive

Middle school is a time of transition. Transitioning between schools, between social circles, and transitioning physically and socially from children into teenagers can be challenging and confusing. Advisory programs are important because they give students time that is specifically designed to help them succeed academically. Our students meet with their advisory teachers to prepare and plan for the day ahead, get a head start on homework and assignments, or study before leaving for the day. They can speak with teachers about classes or subjects that they are struggling with (especially important for students who might not be comfortable speaking up and asking questions in class). Students also meet once a month to review their grades, test data and attendance while setting personal goals for the next month. Beyond simply supporting strong academics, this also helps students develop important skills that will help them succeed throughout the rest of their lives: time management, understanding how to plan ahead, self-advocacy, and the ability to ask for help when it is needed.

District Literacy Coach

We are excited to have Jessica Crawford with us this year as our District Literacy Coach. Jessica has developed a partnership with teachers to help guide their lessons and strategies for students. She is also supporting teachers in the specific area of Disciplinary Literacy to incorporate essential literacy practices in order to make a positive impact on student learning. Mrs. Crawford will visit classrooms to experience the classroom environments, meet with teachers to determine goals, provide resources as needed, co-plan to reach goals, and support teachers in any other way they may need. This is a wonderful opportunity to help our teachers at Chatterton master a full range of strategies to accommodate the diverse set of student needs and improve reading achievement.

Great Instruction, Great Achievement

Litzgerald High School has teamed up with John O'Connor, a 30-year veteran in the field of education, to work one on one with our teachers to take their classroom instruction from good to great. Our teachers will learn and implement new strategies to engage ALL students, promote flexibility in grouping our students, as well as increase the engagement and excitement about learning in the classroom.

Inside many classrooms at Fitzgerald High School you may find two teachers. Students in these classrooms will have a different experience than a classroom with one. These teachers can provide small group instruction to more students without having to leave the classroom. When in smaller groups with a teacher, students are more likely to participate and will be provided more immediate feedback for improvement from the teachers.

Participating staff have attended professional development and will now have Mr. O'Connor join their classroom to provide on site training with our staff and students.





Growing Opportunities for Fitzgerald Virtual Academy Students



As technology for online school continues to evolve, so do the number of families looking to enroll their students in an online program. Our virtual program has new faces in the office this year. Mrs. Sharron Yoshonis and Ms. Kaitlyn Stanley have been working to provide our students with the best opportunities possible. Choosing an online school shouldn't mean sacrificing social opportunities. FVA is now providing more face to face opportunities for students through on site tutoring, as well as field trips, to explore career options and support online learning experiences.

On site tutoring is available to students currently in Math, Science and Spanish. Students can schedule these free tutoring sessions around their lab time each week.

This Construction Career Expo focused on skilled trades including: architecture, engineering, project management, skill building trades and more.
